

CONTRIBUTORS TO THIS ISSUE

Arthur B. Ferguson, Professor of History at Duke University, is the author of *The Indian Summer of English Chivalry* and of *The Articulate Citizen and the English Renaissance*. He has previously published an article in the *J.B.S.*

J. H. Hexter, Charles J. Stillé Professor of History at Yale University and director of the Yale Parliamentary Diaries Project, is the author of *The Reign of King Pym* and of *Reappraisals in History*. He had an early article in the *J.B.S.*, in addition to his long review article.

Gertrude Himmelfarb is Professor of History at Brooklyn College of the City University of New York and the author of *Darwin and the Darwinian Revolution* and of *Lord Acton: A Study in Conscience and Politics*. She incorporated much of the material of her previously published *J.B.S.* article in her recent book, *Victorian Minds*.

James William Johnson, Professor of English at the University of Rochester and author of *Logic and Rhetoric* and of *The Formation of English Neo-Classical Thought*, has contributed two earlier articles to the *J.B.S.* Currently he is working on an edition of the plays of John Wilmot and completing a study of English Neo-Classicism and the tragic vision.

W. R. Jones is Associate Professor of History and chairman of the department at the University of New Hampshire. He has published other articles on medieval studies.

J. A. Raftis, Professor of History at the Pontifical Institute of Mediaeval Studies, University of Toronto, is the author of *The Estates of Ramsey Abbey* and of *Tenure and Mobility, Studies in the Social History of the Mediaeval English Village*. He has been the recipient of research grants from the Social Science Research Council of New York and is at present a Canada Council Fellow.

David M. Ricci is Assistant Professor of Political Science at the Pennsylvania State University.

James C. Robertson, Lecturer in History at Catford College, London, is completing his dissertation at the University of London.

A. G. L. Shaw, who is Professor of History at Monash University, Victoria, is the author of *Convicts and the Colonies* and of *The Story of Australia*. He has been a section editor of the *Australian Dictionary of Biography* and a Smuts Fellow in Commonwealth History at the University of Cambridge.

F. B. Smith, Senior Fellow in History at the Australian National University, Canberra, is the author of *The Making of the Second Reform Bill*.
