Museum and Heritage Summer Placements

The Society offers a number of bursaries of £250 to support students undertaking a summer placement in a museum. Placements are normally held sometime during the summer vacation; the exact length and timing is to be agreed between the successful candidates and museum. Museums and other organisations which have hosted placements recently include the British Museum, the Great North Museum, the Roman Baths in Bath, Corinium Museum, the Institute of Classical Studies, the University of London and English Heritage. Details of the 2019 scheme will be available on the Society's website from January.

All undergraduate and MA students are eligible to apply. Candidates should apply by letter setting out their reasons for wishing to undertake an internship and outlining any previous experience of working in a museum, and providing the name and email address of a referee. Letters of application should be addressed to the Secretary of the Roman Society, and sent by email (office@romansociety.org) by 30 April 2019.

Schools Committee

The Schools Committee responds to issues concerning the teaching and examining of classics subjects in schools, teacher training and the provision of PGCEs. **Grants** to schools are available to help promote the teaching of Latin and Roman Studies. Most of the grants are awarded for the purchase of textbooks and other books on Roman topics, but the Committee also makes awards to groups, museums and schools organising lectures or study days on Roman themes. Applications from schools planning to start courses in Latin are particularly welcome.

The annual budget is £15,000, and the usual level of award is £50 to £500. The Committee meets three times a year. Applications should be sent to the Secretary, Roman Society, Malet Street, London WC1E 7HU, or by email (office@romansociety.org) to arrive by 1 February, 1 July or 1 November in any year. There is no special application form, but applicants should provide information about the level of their departmental budget, the type of courses taught, and in the case of applications for books, a list of the books wanted with their prices.

Archaeology Committee

The Archaeology Committee was formed in 1993. Its brief was to organise a regular conference to act 'as a forum where those interested in the archaeology of the Roman Empire and those more specifically concerned with Roman Britain' could come together. This initiative has led to a highly successful series of international conferences, held in the Universities of Reading, Nottingham, Durham, Glasgow, Leicester, Birmingham, London, Michigan (Ann Arbor), Oxford, Frankfurt, Rome and Edinburgh. The next RAC will be in Split (2020).

A prize for the best BA dissertation in the field of Roman Archaeology is awarded at RAC. The next closing date is 1 November 2019. For details of how to submit an entry, see the website:

Hellenic and Roman Societies' Slides Collection

The slides collection contains over 6,700 coloured 35 mm slides covering a wide variety of subjects, including sites on the Greek mainland, the Greek islands, Cyprus, Rome, Italy and the Roman Empire, Etruscan tomb paintings, Greek vases, Roman frescoes and mosaics, the Roman army, and Roman Britain. Slides of artefacts form a large part of the collection and include bronzes, jewellery and vases as well as maps, plans, models and reconstructions. A subject index is available. A Greek slide catalogue is available at £7.50, a Roman slide catalogue at £6.50 *or* both for £12 (postage £1 extra for each catalogue).
