THE CONTRIBUTORS

ROGER HILSMAN, JR., was in the Office of Strategic Services during the war and received a Ph.D. degree from Yale University in 1951. At present he is serving in the Joint Military Advisory Group, Europe, which is concerned with the Military Aid Program and American participation in NATO.

P. E. CORBETT has been professor of government and jurisprudence at Yale University, and is now a member of the Center of International Studies, Princeton University. Among his publications are *Britain: Partner for Peace* (1946) and *Law and Society in the Relations of States* (1951).

RAYMOND L. GARTHOFF is currently on the staff of the Social Science Division of The RAND Corporation as a specialist on Russian and Soviet affairs. He has contributed several articles to *World Politics*.

PHILIP W. BELL is assistant professor of economics at Haverford College. During the past academic year he worked with George F. Kennan at the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton on a Ford Foundation grant. His publications include two chapters in *The Economics of Freedom*, edited by H. S. Ellis (1950).

GRAYSON L. KIRK is Vice President and Provost of Columbia University, and acting head in the absence of the President. He is the author of *Philippine Independence* (1936), *Contemporary International Politics*, with W. R. Sharp (1940), and *The Study of International Relations in American Colleges and Universities* (1947). He is an advisory editor of *World Politics*.

QUINCY WRIGHT is professor of international law at the University of Chicago, and president of the International Political Science Association. He is the author of *Mandates under the League of Nations* (1930), *Legal Problems in the Far Eastern Conflict* (1941), and *A Study of War* (1942). He is an advisory editor of *World Politics*.

LAWRENCE S. FINKELSTEIN is a member of the staff of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. He has been affiliated with the Division of Dependent Area Affairs in the Department of State and the Trusteeship Division of the UN Secretariat, and was a lecturer in government in the School of General Studies at Columbia University.
