THE CONTRIBUTORS

S. BERNARD is a member of the Institut Emile Vandervelde, Centre d'Etudes du Parti Socialiste Belge, in Brussels. Admitted to the bar in 1940, he served in the Belgian resistance movement, and acted as private secretary to the Minister of the Interior during the ministry of Premier Spaak. He has collaborated recently on a volume dealing with the Schuman Plan for the Institut des Relations Internationales of Brussels, which will be published in Paris early in 1953.

KARL W. DEUTSCH is professor of history and political science at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, on leave in 1953 as a visiting professor at the Center of Research on World Political Institutions, Princeton University. He is the author of two forthcoming books, *Nationalism and Social Communication* and *An Interdisciplinary Bibliography on Nationalism, 1935-1952*.

ROWLAND T. BERTHOFF has a Fulbright grant during the current academic year at the University College of Wales, Aberystwyth, for research on a book entitled *British Immigrants in Industrial America, 1790-1950*, which will be published this fall. He wrote the article in this issue of *World Politics* while on the staff of the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton in 1951-1952.

DERWENT WHITTLESEY is professor of geography at Harvard University; his special interests—political geography in general and regional geography of Africa—are fused in the present article. He has recently completed a report on Regional Geography and the Geographic Region for a forthcoming volume, *American Geography: Inventory and Prospect*. Professor Whittlesey is an advisory editor of *World Politics*.

WILLIAM W. KAUFMANN is a research associate in the Center of International Studies, Princeton University, and a member of the editorial board of *World Politics*.

RICHARD D. CHALLENGER is assistant professor of history at Princeton University. He has contributed articles to *Modern France: Problems of the Third and Fourth Republics*, edited by Edward Mead Earle (1951), and *The Diplomats*, edited by Gordon A. Craig and Felix Gilbert, which will appear this spring.
