Publication of the *Proceedings* of the Society's 1986 Annual Meeting has been bedeviled by what has often seemed a wholly unbelievable combination of untoward circumstances. In addition, the *Proceedings'* record-breaking size reflects the continuing evolution of the Society's Annual Meeting in number, diversity, and intellectual richness of discussions, panels, and workshops. Thanks are due to all who assisted in the editing process, especially the Reporters, without whom it would be very difficult if not impossible to get the *Proceedings* done at all.

Particular thanks are due to Professor Anthony D'Amato who, when the Reporter assigned to the panel on The Authority of the U.S. Executive to Interpret, Articulate or Violate the Norms of International Law failed to discharge her responsibility, undertook to do the report himself.

An explanatory comment is perhaps in order here: the *Proceedings* do not purport to be a verbatim record of what transpired. Rather, Reporters are instructed to summarize what is said (even though rendering the summaries in first-person singular); in addition, all speakers are given the opportunity to edit the Reporter's version before it is published. This results, we believe, in a leaner but still accurate record of what occurred than would, for example, publication of transcripts. It is faithful to what actually was said, but is presented in the way that it ought to have been said—at least this is what we have tried to do—cast into written, rather than spoken, English.
